Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Florida High School for Accelerated Learning – Metro Broward, Inc. d/b/a Flagler High School (the "School"), a component unit of the School Board of Broward County, Florida, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the School, as of June 30, 2017, and the respective changes in financial position, and budgetary comparison for the General Fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 through 6 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplemental information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated October 9, 2017, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

As management of Florida High School for Accelerated Learning – Metro Broward, Inc. d/b/a Flagler High School (the “School”), a component unit of the School Board of Broward County, Florida, we offer readers of the School’s basic financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the School for the year ended June 30, 2017 with certain comparative information for 2016.

Management’s discussion and analysis is included at the beginning of the School’s basic financial statements to provide, in layman’s terms, the past and current position of the School’s financial condition. This summary should not be taken as a replacement for the audit, which consists of the basic financial statements and other supplementary information.

Financial Highlights

Our basic financial statements provide these insights into the results of this year’s operations.

- The School’s total assets exceeded its liabilities by \$ 94,248 (net position). This amount includes net investment in capital assets of \$ 4,298, restricted net position of \$ 11,230, and an unrestricted net position of \$ 78,720.
- The School’s total revenues were \$ 1,636,599 including \$ 1,231,686 from Florida Education Finance Program (FEFP) revenue, \$ 84,181 from program revenues and \$ 320,732 from miscellaneous revenues, which includes financial support in the form of a contribution from Accelerated Learning Solutions, Inc. of \$ 313,895. The School’s expenses for this year were \$ 1,625,553.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the School’s basic financial statements. The School’s basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide basic financial statements, 2) fund basic financial statements, and 3) notes to the basic financial statements. This report also contains other supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves.

Government-Wide Basic Financial Statements: The government-wide basic financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School’s finances in a manner similar to a private sector business.

The statement of net position presents information on all of the School’s assets, liabilities, and deferred inflows/outflows of resources, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the School’s net position changed during the year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g. uncollected revenues and services rendered but unpaid).

The government-wide basic financial statements include all governmental activities that are principally supported by grants and entitlements from the state for full-time equivalent funding. The School does not have any business-type activities. The governmental activities of the School primarily include instruction and instructional support services.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 7 and 8 of this report.

Fund Basic Financial Statements: A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The School, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

Governmental Funds: Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the basic government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide basic financial statements, governmental fund basic financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the School’s near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide basic financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide basic financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the School’s near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and change in fund balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The School maintains several individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and change in fund balances. The General Fund and Capital Project Fund are considered to be the School’s major funds.

The School adopts an annual budget for its governmental funds. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the General Fund to demonstrate compliance with the budget.

The governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 9 through 15 of this report.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements: The notes provide additional information that is essential for a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund basic financial statements. The notes to basic financial statements can be found on pages 16 through 21 of this report.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

The School’s net position was \$ 94,248 at June 30, 2017 and \$ 83,202 at June 30, 2016. Our analysis in the table below focuses on the net position of the School’s governmental activities as follows:

A portion of the School’s net position reflects its investment in capital assets. The School uses these capital assets to provide services to students; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used are classified as restricted net position. At June 30, 2017 and 2016, the School had \$ 11,230 and \$ 5,230 in restricted net position, respectively.

Capital Assets and Debt Administration

Capital assets: The School’s investment capital assets at June 30, 2017 were \$ 4,298 net of accumulated depreciation compared to \$ 9,851 at June 30, 2016.

Debt administration: At June 30, 2017, the School had no outstanding debt.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The original budget was amended due to a forecasted decrease of students of 45%.

Total revenues were under budget by approximately \$ 250,000. The School reported 192 unweighted FTE compared to 200 unweighted FTE in the final budget, which resulted in unfavorable FEFP revenues of approximately \$ 41,000. In addition, there were unfavorable federal and local revenues of approximately \$ 209,000.

Total expenditures were under budget by approximately \$ 272,000 mainly due to lower administrative and instruction costs. See page 13 for budget to actual comparisons detail.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budget

FEFP funding per student will increase by approximately \$ 80 or 1.25% in FY 2018 as compared to FY 2017. The management agreement continues to provide for the delivery of services despite any revenue shortfalls. Enrollment will be sufficient.

All these factors were considered in preparing the FY 2018 budget.

Note 1 - Organization and Operations

Florida High School for Accelerated Learning – Metro Broward, Inc. d/b/a Flagler High School (the “School”), (a component unit of the School Board of Broward County, Florida) is part of the Florida system of public education under the general direction of the Florida Department of Education (“FDOE”). The School was incorporated as a Florida not-for-profit corporation in July 2011, and commenced operations as a charter school in July 2013. The School was granted a charter to operate a high school, including grades nine to twelve, by the School Board of Broward County, Florida (the “School Board”) in April 2013. For the year ended June 30, 2017, 192 students were enrolled in the school.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting entity: The School operates under a charter granted by the School Board. The current charter is effective until June 30, 2018, and may be renewed by mutual written agreement between the School and the School Board. At the end of the term of the charter, the School Board may choose not to renew the charter under grounds specified in the charter, in which case the School Board is required to notify the School in writing at least ninety days prior to the charter's expiration. During the term of the charter, the School Board may also terminate the charter if good cause is shown. The School is considered a component unit of the School Board of Broward County, Florida.

The School may also be financially accountable if an organization is fiscally dependent on the School regardless of whether the organization has a separately elected governing board, a governing board appointed by another government, or a jointly approved board. In addition, component units can be other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the School are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's basic financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

As a result of evaluating the above criteria, management has determined that no component units exist for which the School is financially accountable, which would require inclusion in the School's basic financial statements.

Basis of presentation: Based on the guidance provided in the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and provisions of Section 228.056(9), Florida Statutes, the School is presented as a governmental organization for financial statement reporting purposes.

Government-wide basic statements: The School's basic financial statements include both government-wide (reporting the School as a whole) and fund financial statements (reporting the School's major fund). Both the government-wide and fund basic financial statements categorize primary activities as either governmental or business-type. All of the School's activities are classified as governmental activities.

In the government-wide statement of net position, the governmental activities column is presented on a consolidated basis, if applicable, and is reported on a full accrual economic resource basis, which recognizes all noncurrent assets and receivables as well as all noncurrent debt and obligations.

The government-wide statement of activities reports both the gross and net cost of each of the School's functions. The net costs, by function, are also supported by general revenues (unrestricted contributions, investment earnings, miscellaneous revenue, etc.). The statement of activities reduces gross expenses (including provision for depreciation) by related program revenues, operating and capital grants, and contributions. Program revenues must be directly associated with the function. Operating grants include operating-specific and discretionary (either operating or capital) grants while the capital grants column reflects capital-specific grants. For the year ended June 30, 2017, the School had program revenues of \$ 84,181.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

This government-wide focus is more on the ability to sustain the School as an entity and the change in the School's net position resulting from the current year's activities.

Fund basic financial statements: The accounts of the School are organized on the basis of funds. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, equity, revenues, and expenditures.

The School reports the following major governmental funds:

- **General Fund** – This fund is used to account for all operating activities of the School except for those required to be accounted for in another fund.
- **Capital Projects Fund** – This fund is used to account for state capital outlay funding that is legally restricted to expenditures for particular purposes.

Measurement focus and basis of accounting: The basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied. Governmental funds use the current financial resources measurement focus and the governmental-wide statement uses the economic resources measurement focus.

Governmental activity in the government-wide basic financial statements is presented on the full accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recognized when incurred.

The governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting under which revenue is recognized in the accounting period in which it becomes susceptible to accrual (i.e., when it becomes both measurable and available). "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within sixty days after year end or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period.

Cash and cash equivalents: The School considers all demand accounts and money market funds which are not subjected to withdrawal restrictions to be cash and cash equivalents.

The School maintains its cash accounts with one financial institution. The School's accounts at this institution, at times, may exceed the federally insured limit. The School has not experienced any losses in such accounts and does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk.

Due to/from other funds and transfers in/out: Interfund receivables and payables arise from interfund transactions and are recorded by all funds in the period in which transactions are executed. The balances result from the time lag between the dates that interfund goods and services are provided or reimbursable expenditures occur, transaction are recorded in the accounting system, and payments between funds are made. Transfers are made from the General Fund to the Capital Projects Fund to allocate the rebate on the district administrative fee that is to be used for capital outlay, if any.

Due from governmental agencies: Amounts due to the School from governmental agencies are for grants or programs under which the services have been provided by the School. At June 30, 2017, amounts due from governmental agencies represents amounts due from Florida Department of Education for capital outlay funding.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Capital assets: Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$ 1,000 or more are capitalized at historical cost or estimated historical cost and are reported in the government-wide financial statement. Donated capital assets are valued at the estimated fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized and depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

Depreciation on capital assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the respective useful lives ranging from 4 to 5 years.

Within governmental funds, amounts incurred for the acquisition of capital assets are reported as fund expenditures. Depreciation expense is not reported within the governmental fund financial statements.

Deferred outflows/inflows of resources: In addition to assets, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, *deferred outflows of resources*, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will *not* be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The School does not have any items that qualify for reporting in this category.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of net position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, *deferred inflows of resources*, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will *not* be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The School does not have any items that qualify for reporting in this category.

Revenue recognition: Student funding is provided by the State of Florida through the School Board. Such funding is recorded as entitlement revenue in the government-wide financial statements and state source revenue in the fund financial basic statements. The School Board retains a 5% administration fee for enrollment up to and including 250 students. The administration fee is reduced to 3% for the portion of the administration fee representing student population in excess of 250. The difference between the total administrative fee calculation (5%) on total enrollment and the amount of administrative fee withheld (3%) may only be used for capital outlay purposes. This funding is received on a pro-rata basis over a twelve-month period and is adjusted for changes in full-time equivalent (FTE) student population.

Net position: Net position is classified in three categories. The general meaning of each is as follows:

- Net investment in capital assets - represents the difference between the cost of capital assets, less accumulated depreciation reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowings used for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets.
- Restricted net position - consists of net position with constraints placed on their use either by 1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or 2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Unrestricted - indicates that portion of net position that will need to be funded by future operations.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Fund balance: The School has implemented the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board (“GASB”) Statement No. 54, *Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions*. This Statement provides more clearly defined fund balance classifications to report on the nature and extent to which the School is bound to have constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

The following classifications describe the relative strength of the spending constraints:

- *Nonspendable fund balance* – amounts that are not in spendable form (such as prepaid items) or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.
- *Restricted fund balance* – amounts constrained to specific purposes by external providers (such as grantors, creditors, etc.) or imposed by law through constitutional provisions, or by enabling legislation.
- *Committed fund balance* – amounts constrained to specific purposes by formal action of the Board itself, using its highest level of decision making authority (i.e., the Board Members) through resolution or ordinance. To be reported as committed, amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the Board Members take the same highest level action (i.e., resolution or ordinance) to remove or change the constraint.
- *Assigned fund balance* – amounts the School intends to use for a specific purpose but are neither restricted nor committed. Assignments can be made by the Board.
- *Unassigned fund balance* – amounts that have not been assigned to other funds and that have not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the general fund. Positive amounts are only reported in the General Fund.

The School uses restricted amounts to be spent first when both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available unless there are legal documents/contracts that prohibit doing this, such as in grant agreements requiring dollar for dollar spending. Additionally, the School would first use committed fund balance, followed by assigned fund balance when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of the unrestricted fund balance classifications could be used.

Budgets: Operating budgets are adopted and maintained by the governing board for the School pursuant to the requirements of Florida Statutes. The budget is adopted using the same basis of accounting that is used in the preparation of the financial statements.

Income taxes: The School qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under the Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is, therefore, exempt from income tax. Accordingly, no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Date of management review: Subsequent events were evaluated by management through October 9, 2017, which is the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

Note 3 – Cash and Cash Equivalents

At June 30, 2017, the carrying amount and bank balance of the deposits and cash on hand totaled \$163,652.

State statutes require, and it is the School’s policy, that all deposits be made into, and be held by, financial institutions designated by the Treasurer of the State of Florida as qualified public depositories as defined by Chapter 280 of the Florida Statutes. This statute requires that every qualified public depository institution maintain eligible collateral to secure the public entity’s funds. The minimum collateral to be pledged by an institution, the collateral eligible for pledge, and reporting requirements of the qualified public depositor to the treasurer is defined by the statute. Collateral is pooled in a multiple qualified public depository institution pool with the ability to assess members of the pool should the need arise. The School’s deposits are held in a qualified public depository. They are covered by the collateral pool as the School has identified itself as a public entity at June 30, 2017.

Note 4 – Capital Assets

The provision for depreciation for the year ended June 30, 2017 amounted to \$ 5,553. The School allocated 100% of the depreciation to instruction.

Note 5 - Commitments and Contingencies

Management contract: The School has entered into a contractual agreement with Accelerated Learning Solutions, Inc., a Tennessee Corporation (the “Company”), to provide for most of the School’s resources and services. The agreement began upon the commencement of the School in July 2013 and continues through June 2018, at which time the contract will automatically renew for additional, successive five-year terms unless one party notifies the other party at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract. Under the terms of the agreement, the School is charged fees for services of ninety-seven (97%) of the Schools’ qualified gross revenues as defined by the agreement. The fee for services adjusts to ninety-five (95%) for the fourth and fifth years of agreement. Qualified gross revenues include various federal, state and local source revenues with certain exceptions. The qualified gross revenues do not include any federal or state awards that are intended to be a reimbursement of expenditures on a dollar for dollar basis. The Company is also entitled to all grants and contributions not defined by the agreement within the terms of qualified gross revenues. During the year, the Company contributed \$ 313,895 to the School in support. This amount is included in miscellaneous revenues in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 5 - Commitments and Contingencies (continued)

In return for the above fees, the Company shall be responsible for providing salaries for all personnel, costs for curriculum materials, textbooks, library books, facilities, computers and other equipment, software, supplies, maintenance and capital improvements of the School.

The contract may be terminated by the School for non-renewal of the charter with the School Board and for breaches of contract terms which have not been cured within ninety days of written notice at the time of the contract breach. The contract may be terminated by the Company for fiscal year operating deficits (excluding the first year of operations), failure to pay fees due to the Company, material changes in federal or state funding, damages to the school facility that make School operations unfeasible, uneconomical or impractical as long as such notification comes sixty days after the occurrence that caused such a situation.

Upon termination of the agreement, the School has the right to have all real and personal property leases related to the School assigned to and assumed by the School as long as the lease permits assignment, purchase all personal property owned by the Company and used exclusively or primarily in connection with School operations at the asset's "remaining cost basis" which shall be calculated based on the straight-line method of providing for depreciation. Assets with an approximate net book value of \$ 508,000 as of June 30, 2017 have been identified by the Company to be used exclusively or primarily in connection with School operations. The depreciation for these assets is categorized in regular instruction and plant operations and maintenance.

Lease agreement: The School has previously entered into a lease agreement for the facilities which expires in January 2018 and requires monthly payments of approximately \$ 9,500. The lease also calls for annual common maintenance charges to be assessed in addition to other charges including applicable taxes. The lease also contains four renewal options for five years each and assignment rights with prior approval of the landlord. Total rent expense in connection with this lease amounted to approximately \$ 113,500 for the year ended June 30, 2017. In addition, the lease is guaranteed by ALS Education, Inc. (formerly known as Community Education Partners, Inc.), an affiliate of Accelerated Learning Solutions, Inc.

Post-retirement benefits: The School does not provide post-retirement benefits to retired employees. All employees are employees of the management company and benefits are their sole responsibility.

Note 6 - Risk Financing

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, thefts of, damage to, and destruction of assets and natural disasters. The School has obtained property insurance from commercial companies. Claims have not exceeded this commercial coverage since the School's inception.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the School's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

We have audited the financial statements of Florida High School for Accelerated Learning – Metro Broward, Inc. d/b/a Flagler High School (the “School”), a component unit of the School Board of Broward County, Florida, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2017, and have issued our report thereon dated October 9, 2017.

Auditor's Responsibility

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and Chapter 10.850, Rules of the Auditor General.

Other Report

We have issued our Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of the Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. Disclosures in that report, which is dated October 9, 2017, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.
