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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors C.G. Bethel High School

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of C.G. Bethel High School (the "School"), a division of NorthStar Academies, Inc. and a component unit of the Miami-Dade County Public School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.



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Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the School, as of June 30, 2020, and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis Matters

As discussed in Note 1, the financial statements of the School are intended to present the financial position and change in financial position of only that portion of the governmental activities and each major fund of NorthStar Academies, Inc. that is attributable to the transactions of the School. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of NorthStar Academies, Inc. as of June 30, 2020 and the changes in its financial position or budgetary comparisons, where applicable, for the year ended June 30, 2020 in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

The School recorded a decrease in net position and fund balance of (\$673,944) and (\$446,122), respectively, reducing net position and fund balances to \$61,055 and \$282,131. The School's management believes these are primarily due to a significant enrollment shortfall and other factors, as further discussed in Note 13 to the financial statements.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 through 6, and budgetary comparison for the General Fund and Special Revenue Fund on pages 21 and 22, respectively, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 16, 2020, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS



Our discussion and analysis of C.G. Bethel High School's (the "School") financial performance provides an overview of the School's financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2020 with certain comparative information for 2019. Please read it in conjunction with the School's financial statements, which immediately follow this discussion.

Financial Highlights

The following are the highlights of financial activity for the year ended June 30, 2020:

- The School's total assets exceeded its liabilities at June 30, 2020 by \$ 61,055 (net position).
- The School's total revenues were \$ 2,398,186, \$ 2,110,075 from FTE revenues, \$ 262,803 from operating and capital grants, and \$ 25,308 of miscellaneous revenues. The School's expenses for the year were \$ 3,072,130. Net position for the year decreased by \$ 673,944.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the School's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements, and 3) notes to basic financial statements. This report also contains other required supplementary information in addition to the basic financial statements.

Government-wide financial statements: The government-wide financial statements, which consist of the following two statements, are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business:

- The statement of net position presents information on all the School's assets, liabilities, and deferred inflows/outflows of resources, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the School is improving or deteriorating.
- The statement of activities presents information showing how the School's net position changed during the year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The government-wide financial statements include all governmental activities that are principally supported by grants and entitlements from the state for full-time equivalent funding. The School does not have any business-type activities. The governmental activities of the School primarily include instruction and instructional support services.

The government-wide financial statements can be found on pages 7 and 8 of this report.

Fund financial statements: A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The School only has one category of funds - governmental funds.

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as balances of spendable resources available at the end of the year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the School's near-term financing requirements.

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the School's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances provide reconciliations to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The School maintains several individual governmental funds. The General Fund, Special Revenue Fund and Capital Projects Fund are considered to be the School's major funds.

A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the General and Special Revenue Funds to demonstrate compliance with the budget.

The governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 9 through 12 of this report.

Notes to basic financial statements: The notes provide additional information that is essential for a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the basic financial statements can be found on pages 13 through 20 of this report.

Other information: In addition to the basic financial statements and accompanying notes, this report also presents certain required supplementary information concerning the School's General and Special Revenue Funds adopted budget to actual results. Required supplementary information can be found on pages 21 and 22 of this report.

Government-Wide Financial Analysis

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of financial position. The following table reflects the condensed government-wide statements of net position as of June 30, 2020 and 2019:

A portion of the School's net position reflect its investment in capital assets, less any related outstanding debt used to acquire those assets. The School uses these capital assets to provide services to students; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the School's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt (if any), it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities. Resources that are subject to external restrictions on how they may be used are classified as restricted assets. As of June 30, 2020 and 2019, the School had no restricted assets.

As reflected below, the net position is showing a change of \$ (673,944) for the year ended June 30, 2020 and change of \$ 31,365 the year ended June 30, 2019 as summarized in the following table:

Financial Analysis of the School's Funds

As noted earlier, the School uses fund accounting to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The focus of the School's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the School's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance, if any, may serve as a useful measure of the School's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

Capital Asset and Debt Administration

Capital assets: The School's investment in capital assets at June 30, 2020 was \$81,178 net of accumulated depreciation compared to \$76,746 at June 30, 2019. This investment in capital assets is composed of furniture and computer equipment and leasehold improvements. A more detailed analysis is provided in Note 6 to the financial statements.

Long-term debt: At June 30, 2020 and 2019, the School had outstanding debt of \$ 302,254 and \$ 70,000, respectively. A more detailed analysis is provided in Note 7 to the financial statements.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

Total revenues were unfavorable to the budget by \$ 942,477 and total expenditures were favorable to the budget by \$ 251,365. See page 21 for budget to actual comparisons detail.

Economic Factors for 2020-2021

Total funding for capital outlay is expected to increase slightly in the next year, in addition to increases in regular FFEP revenues. Given the student count remains consistent, the overall effect will be a small increase in revenues.

Note 1 - Organization and Operations

C.G. Bethel High School (the "School") is a division of NorthStar Academies, Inc. (the "Entity") and a component unit of the Miami-Dade County Public School District (the "District"). The School commenced operations in July 2009 and offers classes for high school students predominantly in the City of North Miami Beach, Florida. Approximately 307 students were enrolled in classes when the school year ended in June 2020.

The basic financial statements of the School present only the balances, activity and disclosures related to the School. They do not purport to, and do not, present fairly the financial position of NorthStar Academies, Inc. as of June 30, 2020, and the changes in its financial position or budgetary comparisons, where applicable, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting entity: The School operates under a charter granted by the sponsoring school district, the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida (the "School Board"). The current charter is effective until June 30, 2029. At the end of the term of the charter, the School Board may choose not to renew the charter under grounds specified in the charter in which case the School Board is required to notify the School in writing at least ninety days prior to the charter's expiration. During the term of the charter, the School Board may also terminate the charter if good cause is shown. The School is considered a component unit of the Miami-Dade County Public School District.

The School may also be financially accountable if an organization is fiscally dependent on the School regardless of whether the organization has a separately elected governing board, a governing board appointed by another government, or a jointly approved board. In addition, component units can be other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the School are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. As a result of evaluating the above criteria, management has determined that no component units exist for which the School is financially accountable which would require inclusion in the School's financial statements.

Basis of presentation: Based on the guidance presented in the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants Audit and Accounting Guide — Not-for-Profit Organizations and provisions of Section 228.056(9), Florida Statutes, the School is presented as a governmental organization for financial statement reporting purposes.

Government-wide financial statements: Government-wide financial statements, including the statement of net position and the statement of activities, present information about the School as a whole.

Government-wide financial statements are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus. The statement of activities presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each function or program of the School's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program, or department and are thereby clearly identifiable to a particular function.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Program revenues include charges paid by the recipient of the goods or services offered by the program and grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program. Revenues that are not classified as program revenues are presented as general revenues. The comparison of direct expenses with program revenues identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing or draws from the general revenues of the School.

Fund financial statements: Fund financial statements report detailed information about the School in the governmental funds. The focus of governmental fund financial statements is on major funds rather than reporting funds by type. Each major fund is reported in a separate column. Because the focus of governmental fund financial statements differs from the focus of government-wide financial statements, a reconciliation is presented with each of the governmental fund financial statements.

The School reports the following major governmental funds:

- **General Fund** This fund is used to account for all operating activities of the School except for those required to be accounted for in another fund.
- **Special Revenue Fund** This fund is used to account for federal grants that are legally restricted to expenditures for particular purposes.
- Capital Projects Fund This fund is used to account for state capital outlay funding that is legally restricted to expenditures for particular purposes.

Net position: Net position is classified in three categories. The general meaning of each is as follows:

- Net investment in capital assets represents the difference between the cost of capital assets, less accumulated depreciation reduced by the outstanding balances of any borrowings used for the acquisition, construction or improvement of those assets (if any).
- Restricted net position consists of net position with constraints placed on their use either by 1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or 2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Unrestricted indicates that portion of net position that will need to be funded by future operations.

Fund balance: The School has implemented the provisions of GASB Statement No. 54, *Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions*. This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance classifications to report on the nature and extent to which the school is bound to have constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

The following classifications describe the relative strength of the spending constraints:

• Nonspendable fund balance – consists of amounts that are not in spendable form and of net position that are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

- Restricted fund balance consists of amounts with constraints placed on their use either by 1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or 2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- Committed fund balance consist of amount that can be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by the government itself, using its highest level of decision making authority.
- Assigned fund balance consists of amounts that are constrained by the government's intended use of resources but are neither restricted nor committed.
- Unassigned consists of net resources in excess of what can be properly classified in one
 of the above categories.

When expenditures are incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, the School considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When expenditures are incurred for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balances are available, the School considers amounts to have been spent first out of committed funds, then assigned funds and finally unassigned funds, as needed, unless the School's governing body or its delegated official or body has provided otherwise in its commitment or assignment actions. The details of the fund balances are included in the Balance Sheet- Governmental Funds on page 9.

Measurement focus and basis of accounting: The basis of accounting refers to the point at which revenues or expenditures/expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. It relates to the timing of the measurements made regardless of the measurement focus applied. Governmental funds use the current financial resources measurement focus and the government-wide statement uses the economic resources measurement focus.

Governmental activity in the government-wide financial statements is presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

The governmental fund financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting under which revenue is recognized in the accounting period in which it becomes susceptible to accrual (i.e., when it becomes both measurable and available). "Measurable" means the amount of the transaction can be determined and "available" means collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the current period is defined as sixty days.

Cash and cash equivalents: The School maintains its cash accounts with two financial institutions. The School's accounts at these institutions, at times, may exceed the federally insured limit. The School has not experienced any losses in such accounts and does not believe it is exposed to any significant credit risk (Note 3).

Prepaid items: Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items.

Due to and due from other funds: Interfund receivables and payables arise from interfund transactions and are recorded by all funds affected in the period in which transactions are executed. The balances result from the time lag between the dates that interfund goods and services are provided or reimbursable expenditures occur, transactions are recorded in the accounting system, and payments between funds are made.

Note 2 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Capital assets: Capital assets purchased or acquired are capitalized at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Capital assets are defined by the School as assets with an initial cost of \$ 1,000 and a useful life of over one year. Donated capital assets are valued at their estimated fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements, and other expenditures that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized and depreciated over the remaining useful lives of the related capital assets. Other costs for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the capital assets estimated useful lives as follows:

Furniture and computer equipment 3-5 years Leasehold improvements 5 years

Compensated absences: The School's policy allows certain employees to carry over unused vacation time during the year. Unused sick leave benefits are not paid upon separation from service. No liability for compensated absences was recorded for the year ending June 30, 2020.

Unearned revenue: Unearned revenue arises when the School receives resources before it has legal claim to them.

Deferred outflows/inflows of resources: In addition to assets, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred outflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred outflows of resources, represents a consumption of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an outflow of resources (expense/expenditure) until then. The School does not have any items that qualify for reporting in this category.

In addition to liabilities, the statement of financial position will sometimes report a separate section for deferred inflows of resources. This separate financial statement element, deferred inflows of resources, represents an acquisition of net position that applies to a future period(s) and so will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that time. The School does not have any items that qualify for reporting in this category.

Revenue recognition: Student funding is provided by the State of Florida through the District. Such funding is recorded as entitlement revenue in the government-wide financial statements and state source revenue in the fund financial statements and is net of a 5% administration fee, for the first 250 students, retained by the District. This funding is received on a pro rata basis over a twelve-month period and is adjusted for changes in full-time equivalent (FTE) student population.

Grant and contract revenue: Grant and contract revenue is recognized when the allowable costs, as defined by the individual grant or contract, are incurred.

Use of estimates: The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Date of management review: Subsequent events were evaluated by management through September 16, 2020, which is the date the financial statements were available for issuance.

Note 3 - Cash and Cash Equivalents

At June 30, 2020, the carrying amount of the deposits and cash on hand totaled \$ 125,075, with a bank balance of \$ 141,702.

State statutes require, and it is the School's policy, that all deposits be made into, and be held by, financial institutions designated by the Treasurer of the State of Florida as "qualified public depositories" as defined by Chapter 280 of the Florida Statutes. This Statute requires that every qualified public depository institution maintain eligible collateral to secure the public entity's funds. The minimum collateral to be pledged by an institution, the collateral eligible for pledge, and the reporting requirements of the qualified public depositor to the Treasurer is defined by statute. Collateral is pooled in a multiple qualified public depository institution pool with the ability to assess members of the pool should the need arise. The School's deposits are held in a qualified public depository and are covered by the collateral pool because the School has identified itself as a public entity.

Note 4 - Budgets

The School formally adopted budgets for the General, Special Revenue and Capital Projects Funds by function for the year ended June 30, 2020. The budgets have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. A comparison of actual results of operations to the budgeted amounts for the General Fund and Special Revenue Fund are presented as required supplementary information.

Note 5 - Due from Government Agencies

Due from government agencies at June 30, 2020 consists of an amount due from the District for capital outlay and Title IV funds.

Note 6 - Capital Assets

A summary of changes in governmental capital assets is as follows:

The provision for depreciation for the year ended June 30, 2020 amounted to \$ 35,763. The School allocated 37% of the depreciation to instructional support services and 63% to the operation of the facility.

As part of the School's charter contract, all capital assets purchased with public funds will automatically revert to the District upon the non-renewal or termination of this contract.

Note 7 - Debt

The School previously executed a note payable to Chambers High School ("Chambers"). This note bears interest, compounded monthly, at an annual rate of 5%. All outstanding principal and accrued interest were due and payable on May 1, 2020 and is in the process of being renewed through May 1, 2021.

On April 21, 2020, the Entity, whom the School is a division, executed a promissory note for \$ 1,080,740 under the Paycheck Protection Program ("PPP") authorized by the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (the "CARES Act"). The loan bears interest rate at 1.00% per annum. Under the PPP, loan funds are eligible for forgiveness to the extent that they are used to cover certain payroll, rent, and utility costs and if the Foundation maintains certain employment levels during a specified period of time. If the Small Business Administration ("SBA") confirms full forgiveness of the unpaid balance of the note, the Entity's obligation under this arrangement will be deemed fully satisfied. The Entity remains obligated to repay to the lender any amount not forgiven, which will mature on the 2nd anniversary of the note. Principal and interest payments are deferred until the lender receives a forgiveness determination from SBA. If the Entity does not apply for forgiveness within 10 months after the last day of their covered period, as applicable, it would be required to make payments on the PPP loan beginning 10 months after the last day of such covered period. At such time, the bank will establish the amount of monthly payments due (principal and interest) based on the remaining time up until its maturity. The proceeds of this loan were allocated to five Schools (the School, Chambers High School, Andrews High School, Sunrise High School and Palm Beach Preparatory Charter Academy) that are within the Entity. The School was allocated \$ 232,254 of the \$ 1,080,740, which is the outstanding balance as of June 30, 2020.

Note 8 - Contingencies and Commitments

Grant agreements: The School received financial assistance from Federal and local governmental agencies in the form of grants. The disbursement of funds received under these programs generally requires compliance with terms and conditions specified in the grant agreements and may be subject to audit by the grantor agencies. In accordance with Title 2 *U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance)* and the Florida Single Audit Act, the School is not required to conduct "single audits" since the required threshold for both federal awards and state financial assistance is currently \$ 750,000 and the School did not exceed either threshold.

Note 8 - Contingencies and Commitments (continued)

Lease Commitment: The School entered into an operating lease for the rental of its facility with monthly payments of approximately \$30,800 per month through June 30, 2024. The lease contains two (2) five (5) year renewal options. Total expense in connection with the facility lease amounted to \$370,000 for the year ended June 30, 2020.

Management Agreement: The School operates under a management agreement with EdisonLearning, Inc. ("Edison"), which is a third-party education service provider. The contract provided for assisting the School in the performance of most administrative, operating, financial duties and providing operating equipment. The management agreement's term is for ten academic school years ending with the 2028-2029 school year to be concurrent with the renewal of the charter. The agreement provided for an additional five-year term or such periods that are consistent with the charter contract term. In exchange for the aforementioned services, the School's Board agreed on a fee annually contained in their budget. For the year ended June 30, 2020, the total amount of compensation paid to Edison amounted to approximately \$556,000. At June 30, 2020, the School had an amount due from Edison amounting to \$419,542, which represents advanced monies for School expenses. These funds were originally anticipated for financing certain acquisitions and then paid back through proceeds of that transaction. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the School was unable to complete the transaction and the amount due from Edison are planned to be reimbursed through uncharged services for their management fees charged in the next fiscal year.

Post-retirement benefits: The School offers the opportunity to participate in its defined contribution 401(k) plan to eligible employees. The School did not make a contribution to the plan for the year ended June 30, 2019.

Note 9 - Related Party Transactions

The School is related to Chambers, as they are governed under the same Board of Directors and are both divisions of the Entity. As stated in Note 7, the School was previously advanced funds, in the form of a note payable obligation. The outstanding balance of this obligation at June 30, 2020 was \$ 70,000. In addition, at June 30, 2020, the school had an amount due to Chambers amounting to \$ 385,116, which represents expenses paid on behalf of the School due to the enrollment shortfall.

The School is related to Palm Beach Preparatory Charter Academy ("PBPCA"), as they are also governed under the same Board of Directors and are both divisions of the Entity. At June 30, 2020, the School had an amount due from PBPCA amounting to \$69,039, which represents PPP loan funds that deposited into the account of this School.

In addition, at June 30, 2020, the Entity has a balance owed to the School amounting to \$ 6,600, which represents expenses paid by the School on behalf of the Entity.

Note 10 - Income Taxes

The School is a division of a nonprofit corporation that qualifies as a tax-exempt organization under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3), and is, therefore, exempt from income tax. Accordingly, no tax provision has been made in the accompanying financial statements.

Note 11 - Risk Financing

The School is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, thefts of, damage to, and destruction of assets and natural disasters. The School has obtained property insurance from commercial companies including, but not limited to, general liability and errors and omissions insurance. There have been no claims in excess of insurance coverage limits during the current year.

Note 12 - Risks and Uncertainties

In March 2020, the *World Health Organization* declared the outbreak of a coronavirus (COVID-19) a pandemic. As a result, the local and global financial markets are experiencing significant declines and creating economic uncertainties. At this time, it is unknown precisely how this negative outlook will impact the Organization's financial statements in the future. No adjustments have been made to the accompanying financial statements as a result of the current events.

Note 13 - Emphasis of a Matter/Deficits/Deteriorating Financial Conditions

The School recorded a decrease in net position and fund balance of (\$673,944) and (\$446,122), respectively, reducing net position and fund balances to \$61,055 and \$282,131. The School's management believes these are primarily due to a significant enrollment shortfall, as well as the principal having serious medical issues, which was a major factor of the enrollment shortfall. Due to this enrollment shortage, in the second half of the 2020 fiscal year, the School was able to implement a mitigation plan the significantly reduced costs. Management feels these cost savings will increase the fund balance and net position of the School in fiscal year 2021.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Directors C.G. Bethel High School

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of C.G. Bethel High School (the "School"), a division of NorthStar Academies, Inc. and a component unit of the Miami-Dade County Public School District, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated September 16, 2020.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the School's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the School's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control or on compliance. Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the financial statements of C.G. Bethel High School (the "School"), a division of NorthStar Academies, Inc. and a component unit of the Miami-Dade County Public School District, as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2020, and have issued our report thereon dated September 16, 2020.

Auditor's Responsibility

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and Chapter 10.850, Rules of the Auditor General.

Other Reporting Requirements

We have issued our Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. Disclosures in that report, which is dated September 16, 2020, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

Prior Audit Findings
