REPORT OF INDEPENDENT AUDITORS

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying basic financial statements of Arborwood Community Development District as of and for the year ended September 30, 2018, and the related notes to financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Basis for Adverse Opinion on the Discretely Presented Component Unit

The financial statements do not include financial data for the District's legally separate component unit. Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require the financial data for the component unit to be reported with the financial data of the District's primary government unless the District also issues financial statements for the financial reporting entity that include the financial data for its component unit. The District has not issued such reporting entity financial statements. Because of this departure from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the assets, liabilities, net position, revenues, and expenses of the aggregate discretely presented component unit should have been presented.

Adverse Opinion

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on the Discretely Presented Component Unit", the financial statements referred to above do not present fairly, the financial position of the discretely presented component unit of the District as of September 30, 2018, or the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the "Basis for Adverse Opinion on the Discretely Presented Component Unit" paragraph, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the aggregate remaining fund information of the District as of September 30, 2018, and the respective changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Unmodified Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to previously present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the District, as of September 30, 2018, and the respective changes in financial position and the budgetary comparison for the General Fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Governmental accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's Discussion and Analysis and budgetary comparison be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures in accordance with governmental auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted principally of inquires of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued a report dated June 6, 2019 on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations and contracts.

The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Arborwood Community Development District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Management's discussion and analysis of Arborwood Community Development District's (the "District") financial performance provides an objective and easily readable analysis of the District's financial activities. The analysis provides summary financial information for the District and should be read in conjunction with the District's financial statements.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The District's basic financial statements comprise three components; 1) Government-wide financial statements, 2) Fund financial statements, and 3) Notes to financial statements. The Government-wide financial statements present an overall picture of the District's financial position and results of operations. The Fund financial statements present financial information for the District's major funds. The Notes to financial statements provide additional information concerning the District's finances.

The Government-wide financial statements are the **statement of net position** and the **statement of activities**. These statements use accounting methods similar to those used by private-sector companies. Emphasis is placed on the net position of governmental activities and the change in net position. Governmental activities are primarily supported by special assessments.

The **statement of net position** presents information on all assets and liabilities of the District, with the difference between assets and liabilities reported as net position. Net position is reported in three categories; 1) net investment in capital assets 2) restricted and 3) unrestricted. Assets, liabilities, and net position are reported for all Governmental activities.

The **statement of activities** presents information on all revenues and expenses of the District and the change in net position. Expenses are reported by major function and program revenues relating to those functions are reported, providing the net cost of all functions provided by the District. To assist in understanding the District's operations, expenses have been reported as governmental activities. Governmental activities financed by the District include general government and physical environment.

Fund financial statements present financial information for governmental funds. These statements provide financial information for the major governmental funds of the District. Governmental fund financial statements provide information on the current assets and liabilities of the funds, changes in current financial resources (revenues and expenditures), and current available resources.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

Fund financial statements include a balance sheet and a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances for all governmental funds. A statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances – budget and actual, is provided for the District's General Fund. Fund financial statements provide more detailed information about the District's activities. Individual funds are established by the District to track revenues that are restricted to certain uses or to comply with legal requirements.

The government-wide financial statements and the fund financial statements provide different pictures of the District. The government-wide financial statements provide an overall picture of the District's financial standing. These statements are comparable to private-sector companies and give a good understanding of the District's overall financial health and how the District paid for the various activities, or functions, provided by the District. All assets of the District, including capital assets, are reported in the **statement of net position**. All liabilities obligated but not paid by the District, are included. In the **statement of activities** transactions between the different functions of the District are eliminated in order to avoid "doubling up" the revenues and expenses. The fund financial statements provide a picture of the major funds of the District. In the case of governmental activities, outlays for long lived assets are reported as expenditures and long-term liabilities are not included in the fund financial statements. To provide a link from the fund financial statements to the government-wide financial statements, a reconciliation is provided from the fund financial statements to the government-wide financial statements.

Notes to financial statements provide additional detail concerning the financial activities and financial balances of the District. Additional information about the accounting practices of the District is also included in the *notes to financial statements*.

Financial Highlights

The following are the highlights of financial activity for the year ended September 30, 2018:

- The District's total assets exceeded total liabilities by \$69,180,580 (net position).
 Unrestricted net position for governmental activities was \$936,456. Restricted net position was \$4,735,787. Net investment in capital assets for governmental activities was \$63,508,337.
- Governmental activities revenues totaled \$6,236,311 while governmental activities expenses totaled \$4,950,882.

The increase in prepaid bond insurance, deferred outflows of resources and restricted net position is related to the bond refunding in the current year.

The decrease in capital assets and net investment in capital assets was related to current year depreciation.

The increase in unrestricted net position was related to revenues in excess of expenses in the current year.

The increase in charges for services is primarily related to additional special assessments in the current year for a new debt service fund.

The decrease in operating grants and contributions is related to a reduced developer contribution for current year debt service.

The decrease in interest expense is related to the bond refunding in the current year.

The capital asset activity for the current year was depreciation of \$2,008,158.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The budget exceeded actual expenditures primarily because of lower engineering fees, legal fees and preserve and mitigation maintenance expenditures than were anticipated.

There was an amendment to the September 30, 2018 budget to reflect the decrease in anticipated revenues and expenditures.

Debt Management

Governmental Activities debt includes the following:

◆ In June 2005, the District issued \$40,375,000 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 2005A (Master Infrastructure Projects), and \$3,930,000 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 2005B (Master Infrastructure Projects). The Bonds were issued to (i) finance the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping assessable improvements (the "2005 Master Infrastructure Project") comprising a part of the Capital Improvement Plan (as more particularly described herein, the "Capital Improvement Plan"); (ii) pay certain cost associated with the issuance of the 2005 Bonds; (iii) make a deposit into the related Series Reserve Accounts for the benefit of all of the 2005 Bonds; and (iv) pay a portion of the interest to become due on the 2005 Bonds. The bonds were bifurcated in December 2013 into Series 2005A-1, 2005A-2, 2005B-1, and 2005B-2. The outstanding balance at that time, \$36,395,000 and \$2,965,000, was split into two series each, \$7,470,000 and \$28,925,000, and \$775,000 and \$2,190,000. The bonds were refunded and paid off during the current year.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

Debt Management (Continued)

- ♦ In May 2006, the District issued \$46,420,000 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 2006A-1 (Centex Homes Project), and \$33,800,000 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 2006A-2 (Centex Homes Project). The Bonds were issued to (i) refinance the 2005 bond anticipation note, (ii) pay certain cost associated with the issuance of the 2006 Bonds; (iii) make a deposit into the related Series Reserve Accounts for the benefit of all of the 2006 Bonds; and (iv) pay a portion of the interest to become due on the 2006 Bonds. The Series 2006A-1 bonds were bifurcated into Series 2006A-1 and 2006A-3 bonds in December 2010. The outstanding balance at that time, \$43,605,000, was split into two series, \$20,618,600 and \$25,801,400. During the year the bonds were refunded and paid off.
- ♦ In December 2014, the District issued \$4,939,888 Capital Improvement Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2014A-1, \$1,041,652 Capital Improvement Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2014A-2 and \$9,097,400 Capital Improvement Revenue Refunding Bonds, Series 2014B. The bonds included a provision for accreted interest through May 1, 2016, which increased the outstanding balances to \$5,430,000, \$1,145,000 and \$10,000,000. The bonds were issued to refund Series 2005A-1, Series 2005B-1, and Series 2006 A-1 bonds. The balance outstanding at September 30, 2018 was \$5,160,000 for the A-1 bond, \$1,090,000 for the A-2 bond and \$8,600,000 for the B bond.
- ♦ In February 2018, the District issued \$24,465,000 Capital Improvement Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2018A-1 and \$8,740,000 Capital Improvement Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2018A-2. The Bonds were issued to (i) finance the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping assessable improvements; (iii) currently refund and redeem all of Series 2005A-2, Series 2006A-2, and Series 2006A-3 bonds; (iii) pay certain costs associated with the issuance of the Series 2018 Bonds; and (iv) purchase the Reserve Policy to be deposited to the Series 2018A-1 Reserve Account. The balance outstanding at September 30, 2018 was \$24,465,000 for the A-1 bond, and \$8,740,000 for the A-2 bond.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budget

The District does not anticipate any economic factors to have a significant effect on the financial position or the results of operations in fiscal year 2019.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the District have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The District's more significant accounting policies are described below.

1. Reporting Entity

The District was established on June 14, 2004, pursuant to the Rule 42RR-1, Florida Administrative Code and Chapter 190, Florida Statutes. The District was established for the purposes of financing and managing the acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of the infrastructure necessary for community development within its jurisdiction. The District is authorized to issue bonds for the purpose, among others, of financing, funding, planning, establishing, acquiring, constructing or re-constructing, enlarging or extending, equipping, operating and maintaining water management, bridges or culverts, district roads, landscaping, street lights and other basic infrastructure projects within or without the boundaries of the Arborwood Community Development District. The District is governed by a five-member Board of Supervisors who are elected for four year terms. The District operates within the criteria established by Chapter 190, Florida Statutes.

As required by GAAP, these financial statements present the Arborwood Community Development District (the primary government) as a stand-alone government. The reporting entity for the District includes all functions of government in which the District's Board exercises oversight responsibility includes, but is not limited to, financial interdependency, selection of governing authority, designation of management, significant ability to influence operations and accountability for fiscal matters.

Based upon the application of the above-mentioned criteria as set forth by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, the Financial Reporting Entity, the District has identified one discretely presented component unit.

The Discretely presented component unit is a legally separate entity which did not meet the criteria for blending. The discrete component unit of the District is as follows:

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

1. Reporting Entity (Continued)

Arborwood CDD Holdings, Inc. (SPE) – Arborwood CDD Holdings, Inc. is a special purpose entity (SPE) created by provisions in the Trust indenture for the 2005A and 2005B Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds for the temporary purpose of owning, maintaining, selling or disposing of the property related to the bonds. The SPE and its operations, pursuant to an agreement between the SPE, the District and the U.S. Bank National Association (the "Trustee"), are funded from a \$1,335,000 loan from the District prior to the exchange of the 2005A and 2005B Bonds. The Parcel C lands were sold in December 2014 and the loan was repaid. Certain proceeds from the sale of the land were deposited into the SPE and the SPE has not provided the District with any financial information. The SPE is still active, although, the SPE does not hold any assets or liabilities.

2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The basic financial statements of the District are composed of the following:

- Government-wide financial statements
- Fund financial statements
- Notes to financial statements

a. Government-wide Financial Statements

Government-wide financial statements report all non-fiduciary information about the reporting government as a whole. These statements include all the governmental activities of the primary government. The effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements.

Governmental activities are primarily supported by special assessments. Program revenues include charges for services and payments made by parties outside of the reporting government's citizenry if that money is restricted to a particular program. Program revenues are netted with program expenses in the Statement of Activities to present the net cost of each program

Amounts paid to acquire capital assets are capitalized as assets, rather than reported as an expenditure. Proceeds of long-term debt are recorded as liabilities in the government-wide financial statements, rather than as an other financial source.

Amounts paid to reduce long-term indebtedness of the reporting government are reported as a reduction of the related liability, rather than as an expenditure.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

b. Fund Financial Statements

The underlying accounting system of the District is organized and operated on the basis of separate funds, each of which is considered to be a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures or expenses, as appropriate. Governmental resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

Fund financial statements for the primary government's governmental funds are presented after the government-wide financial statements. These statements display information about major funds individually.

Governmental Funds

The District classifies fund balance according to Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 54 – Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions. The Statement requires the fund balance for governmental funds to be reported in classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the government is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in those funds can be spent.

The District has various policies governing the fund balance classifications.

Nonspendable Fund Balance – This classification consists of amounts that cannot be spent because they are either not in spendable form or are legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

Restricted Fund Balance – This classification includes amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes stipulated by constitution, external resource providers, or through enabling legislation.

Assigned Fund Balance – This classification consists of the Board of Supervisors' intent to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. The assigned fund balances can also be assigned by the District's management company.

Unassigned Fund Balance – This classification is the residual classification for the government's general fund and includes all spendable amounts not contained in the other classifications.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

2. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (Continued)

b. Fund Financial Statements (Continued)

Governmental Funds (Continued)

Fund Balance Spending Hierarchy – For all governmental funds except special revenue funds, when restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned fund balances are combined in a fund, qualified expenditures are paid first from restricted or committed fund balance, as appropriate, then assigned and finally unassigned fund balances.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting.

Under the current financial resources measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on the balance sheet. The reported fund balance is considered to be a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financial sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Because of their current financial resource measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types excludes amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities.

Amounts expended to acquire capital assets are recorded as expenditures in the year that resources are expended, rather than as fund assets. The proceeds of long-term debt are recorded as an other financing source rather than as a fund liability.

Debt service expenditures are recorded only when payment is due.

3. Basis of Presentation

a. Governmental Major Funds

<u>General Fund</u> – The General Fund is the District's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

3. Basis of Presentation (Continued)

a. Governmental Major Funds (Continued)

<u>2005 A-2 Debt Service Fund</u> – Accounts for debt service requirements to retire the capital improvement bonds which were used to finance the construction of District infrastructure improvements. The bond series is secured by a pledge (lien) of all debt service special assessment revenues on all acreage of benefited land. This fund was closed out during the year.

<u>2006 Debt Service Fund</u> – Accounts for debt service requirements to retire the capital improvement bonds which were used to redeem the 2005 Bond Anticipation Notes and finance the construction of District infrastructure and improvements. The bond series is secured by a pledge (lien) of all debt service special assessment revenues on all acreage of benefited land. This fund was closed out during the year.

<u>2014 A-1/A-2/B Debt Service Fund</u> – Accounts for debt service requirements to retire the capital improvement bonds which were used to refund Series 2005 A-1, Series 2005 B-1, Series 2005-1 and Series 2006 A-1 bonds. The bond series is secured by a pledge (lien) of all debt service special assessment revenues on all acreage of benefited land.

<u>2018 Debt Service Fund</u> – Accounts for debt service requirements to retire the capital improvement and revenue refunding bonds which were used to fund a capital project and refund the outstanding Series 2005 and Series 2006 bonds. The bond series is secured by a pledge (lien) of all debt service special assessment revenues on all acreage of benefited land.

<u>2005 A/B Capital Projects Fund</u> – The Project Fund accounts for construction of infrastructure improvements within the boundaries of the District.

<u>2018 Capital Projects Fund</u> – The Project Fund accounts for construction of infrastructure improvements funded by the Series 2018 Bonds within the boundaries of the District.

b. Non-current Governmental Assets/Liabilities

GASB Statement 34 requires that non-current governmental assets, such as land and buildings, and non-current governmental liabilities, such as general obligation bonds, be reported in the governmental activities column in the government-wide Statement of Net Position.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

4. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position or Equity

a. Cash and Investments

Chapter 280, Florida Statutes require state and local governmental units to deposit monies with financial institutions classified as "Qualified Public Depositories," a multiple financial institution pool whereby groups of securities pledged by the various financial institutions provide common collateral from their deposits of public funds. This pool is provided as additional insurance to the federal depository insurance and allows for additional assessments against the member institutions, providing full insurance for public deposits.

The District is authorized to invest in those financial instruments as established by Section 218.415, Florida Statutes. The authorized investments consist of:

- 1. Direct obligations of the United States Treasury;
- 2. The Local Government Surplus Funds Trust or any intergovernmental investment pool authorized pursuant to the Florida Interlocal Cooperative Act of 1969;
- 3. Interest-bearing time deposits or savings accounts in authorized qualified public depositories;
- 4. Securities and Exchange Commission, registered money market funds with the highest credit quality rating from a nationally recognized rating agency.

Cash equivalents include time deposits, certificates of deposit and all highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less and held in a qualified public depository as defined by Chapter 280.02, Florida Statutes.

b. Restricted Assets

Certain assets of the District are classified as restricted assets on the Statement of Net Position because their use is limited either by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation; or by restrictions imposed externally by creditors. In a fund with both restricted and unrestricted assets, qualified expenses are considered to be paid first from restricted net position and then from unrestricted net position.

c. Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include land, construction in progress, infrastructure, improvements and equipment, are reported in governmental activities.

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

4. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position or Equity (Continued)

c. Capital Assets (Continued)

The District defines capital assets as assets with an initial, individual cost of \$1,000 or more and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. The valuation basis for all assets is historical cost.

The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend its useful life are not capitalized.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed.

Depreciation of capital assets is computed and recorded by utilizing the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives of the various classes of depreciable capital assets are as follows:

Buildings and improvements 7-39 years
Infrastructure 20-40 years
Improvement 10 years
Machinery and equipment 5-10 years

d. Unamortized Bond Discounts

Bond discounts associated with the issuance of revenue bonds are amortized according to the effective interest method. For financial reporting, unamortized bond discounts are netted against the applicable long-term debt.

e. Prepaid Bond Insurance

Bond insurance associated with the issuance of new debt. The prepaid amount will be amortized over the life of the associated bonds.

f. Deferred Outflows of Resources

Deferred outflows of resources is the consumption of net position by the government that is applicable to a future reported period. Deferred amount on refunding is amortized and recognized as a component of interest expense over the life of the bond.

g. Budgets

Budgets are prepared and adopted after public hearings for the governmental funds, pursuant to Chapter 190 Florida Statutes. The District utilizes the same basis of accounting for budgets as it does for revenues and expenditures in its various funds. Formal budgets are adopted for the general and debt service funds. The legal level of budgetary control is at the fund level. All budgeted appropriations lapse at year end.

NOTE B - RECONCILIATION OF GOVERNMENT-WIDE AND FUND FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Explanation of Differences Between the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and the Government-wide Statement of Net Position

"Total fund balances" of the District's governmental funds (\$4,930,313) differs from "net position" of governmental activities (\$69,180,580) reported in the Statement of Net Position. This difference primarily results from the long-term economic focus of the Statement of Net Position versus the current financial resources focus of the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet. The effect of the differences is illustrated below.

Capital related items

When capital assets (land and improvements and construction in progress that are to be used in governmental activities) are purchased or constructed, the cost of those assets is reported as expenditures in governmental funds. However, the Statement of Net Position included those capital assets among the assets of the District as a whole.

Long-term debt transactions

Long-term liabilities applicable to the District's governmental activities are not due and payable in the current period and accordingly are not reported as fund liabilities. All liabilities (both current and long-term) are reported in the Statement of Net Position.

2. Explanation of Differences Between the Governmental Fund Operating Statements and the Statement of Activities

The "net change in fund balances" for government funds (\$(1,253,344)) differs from the "change in net position" for governmental activities (\$1,285,429) reported in the Statement of Activities. The differences arise primarily from the long-term economic focus of the Statement of Activities versus the current financial resources focus of the governmental funds. The effect of the differences is illustrated below.

The payment for bond insurance for new debt is recognized as an expenditure at the fund level, however, at the government-wide level it is recognized as an asset an amortized over the life of the bonds.

NOTE C - CASH AND INVESTMENTS

All operating deposits are held in qualified public depositories and are included on the accompanying balance sheet as cash and investments.

<u>Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits</u>

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the District's deposits may not be returned to it. The District does not have a formal deposit policy for custodial credit risk; however, they follow the provisions of Chapter 280, Florida Statutes regarding deposits and investments. As of September 30, 2018, the District's bank balance was \$237,064 and the carrying value was \$237,064. Exposure to custodial credit risk was as follows. The District maintains cash deposits in a qualified public depository in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 280, Florida Statutes, which means that all deposits are fully insured by Federal Depositors Insurance or collateralized under Chapter 280, Florida Statutes.

The District categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy recently established by generally accepted accounting principles. The fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset, or paid to transfer a liability, in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure the fair value of the asset. The District uses a market approach in measuring fair value that uses prices and other relevant information generated by market transactions involving identical or similar assets, liabilities, or groups of assets and liabilities.

Assets or liabilities are classified into one of three levels. Level 1 is the most reliable and is based on quoted price for identical assets, or liabilities, in an active market. Level 2 uses significant other observable inputs when obtaining quoted prices for identical or similar assets, or liabilities, in markets that are not active. Level 3 is the least reliable and uses significant unobservable inputs that uses the best information available under the circumstances, which includes the District's own data in measuring unobservable inputs.

Based on the criteria in the preceding paragraph, the investment listed above is a Level 1 asset.

Interest Rate Risk

The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

NOTE C - CASH AND INVESTMENTS (CONTINUED)

Credit Risk

The District's investments in treasury funds, commercial paper, and government loans are limited by state statutory requirements and bond compliance. The District has no investment policy that would further limit its investment choices. As of September 30, 2018, the District's investment in the First American Government Obligation Fund Class Y was rated AAAm by Standard & Poor's.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The District places no limit on the amount it may invest in any one investment. The investments in First American Government Obligation Fund Class Y are 47% and the U S Bank Money Market Fund are 53% of the District's total investments. The District considers any decline in fair value for certain investments to be temporary.

<u>Depository Funds</u> – The bond indentures establish certain funds and determines the order in which revenues are to be deposited into these funds. A description of the significant funds, including their purposes, is as follows:

1. <u>Reserve Fund</u> – The Series 2014A1/A2, 2014B, 2018A-1, and 2018A-2 Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds Reserve Accounts are funded from the proceeds of the Bonds in an amount equal to reserve accounts percentage times the deemed outstanding principal amount of the bonds, as of the time of any such calculation. Monies held in the reserve accounts will be used only for the purposes established in the Trust Indenture.

The District also holds a bond insurance policy in partial satisfaction of the Series 2018A-1 Reserve Account Requirement.

NOTE E – LONG-TERM DEBT (CONTINUED)

In February 2018, the District issued \$24,465,000 Capital Improvement Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2018A-1 and \$8,740,000 Capital Improvement Revenue and Refunding Bonds, Series 2018A-2 which retired the Series 2005A-2, Series 2006A-2, and Series 2006A-3 bonds. The current refunding of the Series 2005A-2, Series 2006A-2, and Series 2006A-3 bonds resulted in a deferred amount on refunding of \$781,028. As a result of this transaction, the District decreases its aggregate debt payment for Series 2018A1/A2 Bonds by \$3,053,039 over the next 18 years and realized an economic gain of approximately \$807,244.

Interfund activity between the General Fund, Debt Service Funds and the Capital Projects Funds is the result of closure of 2005 & 2006 Capital Projects Funds and Debt Service Funds, with remaining monies from those funds being transferred to funds servicing bonds issued in 2018.

NOTE G - ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY AND RELATED PARTIES

A substantial portion of the District's activity is dependent upon the continued involvement of the developers and landowners, the loss of which could have a materially adverse effect on the District. At September 30, 2018, the developers held a significant amount of the assessable property located within District boundaries.

NOTE H - RISK MANAGEMENT

The government is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the government carries commercial insurance.

NOTE I - TRI-PARTY AGREEMENT

On June 19, 2009, the District filed a complaint against one of the original developers (the "Developer") and the bank holding the mortgage (the "Mortgage Holder") seeking to foreclose special assessments levied by the District to secure the District's Series 2005 School Site Acquisition Bonds, Series 2005A Bonds, Series 2005B Bonds and Series 2006A-1 Bonds. The complaint also seeks to foreclose special assessments levied to fund the District's operation and maintenance expenses for Fiscal Year 2009. After the lawsuit was filed, the Developer transferred its interest in the subject real property to a separate landowner who, in turn, transferred the real property to a significant landowner (the "Landowner"). The Landowner has now intervened, but the Landowner's intervention is subordinate to the main proceeding. With the transfer of the real property to the landowner, the Mortgage Holder released its mortgage and as a result, the District voluntarily dismissed the Mortgage Holder from the foreclosure on December 21, 2010. In addition, the Developer ceased defending the action, and the Court entered a default against it. Presently, the Landowner and the District are the only parties actively involved in the litigation. The Court entered partial summary judgment in favor of the District on July 23, 2012.

In March 2013, the Board adopted Resolution 2013-04, which approved the bifurcation of the Series 2005 A and B Bonds, a Tri-Party Agreement and a Forbearance Agreement.

As of September 30, 2018 the "SPE" did not hold any assets or liabilities.

MANAGEMENT LETTER

To the Board of Supervisors Arborwood Community Development District Lee County, Florida

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the financial statements of the Arborwood Community Development District as of and for the year ended September 30, 2018, and have issued our report thereon dated June 6, 2019. Our report was modified to address various issues associated with the financial statements not including the activity of a legally separate component unit (a Special Purpose Entity).

Auditor's Responsibility

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Florida Auditor General.

Other Reports and Schedule

We have issued our Independent Auditor's Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters Based on an Audit of Financial Statements Performed in Accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and our Independent Auditor's Report on an examination conducted in accordance with AICPA Professionals Standards, AT-C Section 315 regarding compliance requirements in accordance with Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General. Disclosures in that report, which is dated June 6, 2019, should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

Prior Audit Findings

Section 10.554(1)(i)1., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we determine whether or not corrective actions have been made to address findings and recommendations made in the preceding financial audit report. The following findings or recommendations were made in the preceding financial audit report:

2013-02 / 2014-02 / 2015-01 - Noncompliance with Provisions of Trust Indenture

Finding: The District did not adequately meet the reserve requirement on the Series 2005A Capital Improvement Revenue Bonds as set forth in the Trust Indenture.

Recommendation: The District should make the necessary arrangements to ensure funds are available to make debt service payments.

2013-02 / 2014-02 / 2015-01 - Noncompliance with Provisions of Trust Indenture (Continued)

Management Response: The Reserve Fund deficiency is a technical violation. The 2005A-2 Reserve Fund is at a slightly higher level than it was at the time of the 2013 Bond Bifurcation. It is the District's intention to work with the Bond Trustee to amend the Bond indenture to reflect the intended Debt Service requirement which would remedy the technical Reserve Fund deficiency. On February 28, 2018, the Series 2005A-2, 2006A-2 and 2006A-3 bonds were refunded. The refunding remedied the technical Reserve Fund violation.

Current Status: On February 28, 2018, the Series 2005A-2, 2006A-2 and 2006A-3 bonds were refunded. The refunding remedied the technical Reserve Fund violation.

Financial Condition

Section 10.554(1)(i)5.a. and 10.556(7), Rules of the Auditor General, requires us to apply appropriate procedures and communicate the results of our determination as to whether or not Arborwood Community Development District has met one or more of the conditions described in Section 218.503(1), Florida Statutes, and to identify the specific conditions met. In connection with our audit, we determined that the Arborwood Community Development District did not meet one of the conditions described in Section 218.503(1), Florida Statutes.

Pursuant to Sections 10.554(1)(i)5.c. and 10.556(8), Rules of the Auditor General, we applied financial conditions assessment procedures as of September 30, 2018 for the Arborwood Community Development District. It is management's responsibility to monitor the Arborwood Community Development District's financial condition; our financial condition assessment was based in part on the representations made by management and the review of the financial information provided by the same.

Section 10.554(1)(i)2., Rules of the Auditor General, requires that we communicate any recommendations to improve financial management. In connection with our audit, we did not have any such recommendations.

Additional Matters

Section 10.554(1)(i)3., Rules of the Auditor General, requires us to communicate noncompliance with provisions of contracts or grant agreements, or abuse, that have occurred, or are likely to have occurred, that have an effect on the financial statements that is less than material but which warrants the attention of those charged with governance. In connection with our audit, we did not note any such findings.
